## A Note From the Rector



### Be Prepared ... for Grace The Rev. Mother Nina Bacas

Just yesterday I was in contact with my friend in Asheville, NC. Although they sustained some fallen trees and a flooded basement during Hurricane Helene, everyone is okay. But the whole region was without power for two weeks, and the roads were unpassable. Any of us could hunker down for a couple of days, but what about after that? When everything falls apart, the natural instinct for people is to walk to the nearest church for help.

My friend is a retired Episcopal bishop. He walked to a Pentecostal church and stood in line for bottled water and food. Neighbors then walked to check in on each other, and shared what they could. When everything falls apart, we turn to God and we turn to each other. My friend experienced tremendous grace.

The photo above is from the basement of the Music & Education building. In case of a local disaster, St. Bart's is prepared to be a point of grace. We have blankets, MREs, water, first aid kits, and more. We keep our stock up to date, even though, God willing, we pray we will never need it. But if something does happen, we are prepared to be that church that people walk to when everything falls apart.

It's hard to imagine needing these supplies, but not hard to imagine the grace that would flow from our church in a crisis.

A scammer has recently been sending phishing emails impersonating St. Bart's clergy or staff members, in an attempt to trick parishioners into sharing personal or financial data. This is a perennial problem with churches. Know that we will never ask for sensitive information or solicit favors, gift cards, or payments of any kind via email. **If you receive one of these messages, please** 

### do not respond.

If you are not sure if an email is legitimate, check the sender's email address. Clergy and staff will contact you only with email addresses ending in @stbartschurch.org. The scammer is using a Gmail address that presents with the name of a clergy or staff member. If you click on the name, you will see the Gmail address. Block this sender, if possible.

Watch Breakfast Investiture of Our 28th Presiding Bishop Saturday, November 2, 8 a.m., Church Office



St. Bart's will be hosting a watch breakfast in the church office so we can participate together in the investiture of our new Presiding Bishop. Please join us!





In the first three centuries after Jesus, there existed various forms of Christianity that were very different from what would later become the Christian orthodoxy that we practice today. Gnostics had a differing view of Christianity. They were seeking direct knowledge of God. They offered salvation from ignorance and fate through knowledge of a higher God, who was greater than the one who created our universe. This higher God sent Jesus, and they claimed that people could have mystical personal contact with that God right now.



St. Bart's is a designated Military Veteran-Friendly Congregation. In fact, the base thrift store is now using our old thrift store's glass display shelving!




### Camp Stevens Acorns to Oaks Auction

New Sacred Ground Circle Forming 12 sessions starting Wednesday, November 20, 3-5 p.m., Zoom Information session on Wednesday, November 6, 3-4 p.m., Zoom

Sacred Ground is The Episcopal Church's free dialogue series on race, racism, and faith, built around a powerful online curriculum of documentary films and readings that focus on Indigenous, Black, Latino/Latina, and Asian/Pacific American histories as they intersect with European American histories. The series provides an opportunity to have difficult but respectful and transformative conversations.

A new EDSD-wide Sacred Ground circle (discussion group) will be starting on Wednesday, November 20. The circle will be limited to 8-12 individuals and will meet for 12 sessions roughly every two weeks—same day and time.

### How to Be a Well-Informed Voter

As Christians, we are called to "speak the truth, and to not mislead others by our silence" (*The Book of Common Prayer*, p. 848). It's crucial, therefore, that we know how to recognize <u>deceitful or misleading information</u> and prevent its spread. Here are some tips on becoming a well-informed voter:

- Diversify your information sources: Relying on a single source of information can create echo chambers and reinforce biases. <u>Diversify</u> your media consumption by choosing a mix of international, left-leaning, right-leaning, and centrist news sources.
- Verify information: Verify information using reliable fact-checking websites like <u>FactCheck.org</u> and <u>PolitiFact</u>, which specialize in debunking

false claims. *This is especially inportant given the increasing use of AIgenerated content, which makes it easier than ever to generate and spread misinformation.* 

 Engage with primary sources: Whenever possible, go directly to the source of the information. Watch campaign speeches and interviews in full, rather than relying on snippets or summaries, which may be biased. Also rely on contextual coverage to help you determine whether something you saw or heard is misinformation.

Election Night Virtual Prayers Tuesday, November 5, 5-7 p.m.


